Kirkmichael and Tomintoul Community Association

Minutes of meeting held on 20th February, 2013 in the Richmond Memorial Hall.

The meeting was very well attended.

The minutes of the previous meeting were accepted as correct with no alterations. M. Fletcher proposed, and P. Grant seconded.

Matters Arising

Representatives from Tomintoul to the Council Budget Consultation Meeting were unable to attend due to bad weather conditions. No follow up information was received by KATCA.

Lindsay Robertson, (Tomintoul and Glenlivet Development Officer) was introduced to everyone.

The installation of the Gas Pipeline was briefly mentioned, and noted that this affected Glenlivet more than Tomintoul.

Snow and ice clearance has been good this year, and residents have mostly complied with the request to park on one side of the road only.

Reports

Cathy Hooper (Crown Representative)

The architect drawing up plans for the 'Lecht Layby' project will be present at the TGDT meeting on 27th February to explain projected plans and gain feedback.

The Cycle Tracks are now completed but need several months to settle.

Plans for the 'Hub' have been submitted for the amended location.(see page 25)

Lindsay Robertson

The lay-by is a key area for consultation with the community. The Lecht and Tomnavoulin Lay-by sites are to be developed as 'Gateway Sites'.

TGDT is working with SYHA to develop Tomintoul Youth Hostel. Mike Fletcher, Sean Marshall and Steve Sacks are the directors working on this project. The Trust will take over the running of the hostel from 1st April. A business plan has been developed.

The Trust is working with Henry Paget regarding The Gordon Arms Hotel. Funding is available to carry out a feasibility study, for which tenders have been submitted. There will be community consultation.

Areas have been mapped out with the poorest broadband coverage. There will be technical consultants to plan out options, and where the cables will come through.

Lindsay invited anyone to give her comments/feedback/ideas to follow up. She is based at The Crown Estate Office.

Fiona Murdoch (Moray Council)

Transport. The buses to Keith on Tuesdays and to Elgin on Thursdays are to be cut. There will be transport, but it will be different to what we have been used to. £30,000,000 has to be cut from the budget which means a 'slimming down' in all areas.

The Council is currently looking at other ways to provide transport. Lindsay Robertson is to provide a questionnaire to people in the community. Fiona Murdoch stated that Tomintoul will not be left without transport, but she needs to know what is needed and when, in order to 'tailor it' to the needs of Tomintoul. Libraries. Tomintoul library is not to be cut. One library in each school area is to be maintained. It is intended that each one will be run by a 'trust', as this will allow better funding access. In July it will be decided which schools and libraries will be cut.

After the cuts this year, there will still be cuts of another £10,000,000 to be made.

Visitor Centre. The Council want the Tourist Information Centre to be run by a Trust. There will be consultation. The building is undergoing a survey at the moment.

Moray Council is involved with a new project where areas are looked at in turn, to look at resources available within the area.

Savings and wastage questions were brought up, and Fiona Murdoch stated that the council tries to ensure resources are not wasted.

Mike Drury commented that there was a need for a bus service, not just for local residents, but also for tourism, which may need to go to Grantown, Aviemore etc., and also that this may not be a free service, but something run by the community, which would need to be paid for.

Fiona Murdoch agreed that this is the area that the council is looking at, and funding is available for Community based projects, not run by Moray Council.

Discussions took place, with many anecdotal references regarding:

Bus times.

Inaccessibility of Dial-a-Bus.

Difficulty with connecting buses etc.

Some people stated that they were prepared to pay towards bus fares, while others were not. It was pointed out that other travellers were picked up along the way to Elgin, not just in Tomintoul and Glenlivet. There are just 4 Dial-a-Buses available for the whole of Speyside.

Students needing to go to College from the village.

How services work, and how they link to other services.

The £70,000 is available to mitigate losses of a bus service.

The fact that there are only 2 buses per week from Tomintoul.

Flexibility of the questionnaire.

Sally Reid stated that Councillors were voted for because people felt they would work for the voters, but time after time voters were being let down. We have to fight to get support for Tomintoul. We need to know that Councillors are fighting for the small rural areas.

If people feel strongly, they should object on their own behalf, as well as KATCA sending a letter on behalf of the whole community. Letters should be sent to Fiona Murdoch at Moray Council. The Elgin bus is a 'lifeline' for many, and should be kept at all costs.

If anyone wishes to raise an agenda item, please contact any member of the committee, who will be happy to bring it up for discussion.

The next meeting is on 15thMay, 2013, at 7-30pm, followed by the A.G.M.

I have been following the progress of plans for Mountain Bike Trails near Tomintoul with great interest.

Without getting into the ins and outs of the most appropriatelocation, access provision and the myriad of other planning issues it is good to see ambitious plans in some of our more rural areas that could bring additional visitors and provide valuable support to the local economy both through direct employment and through spending in local shops, on accommodation and food and drink.

The success of Fort William, which has badged itself as the 'Outdoor Capital' has set an example that many other regions of Scotland, including, Moray can use to their advantage. Mountain biking as a sport has really taken off and is becoming more and more accessible every year with new trails being opened up and the country becoming a world-class destination for participants.

With bike uplift available at the nearby Lecht centre and trails at Fochabers and other nearby locations the new trails could really boost the sports tourism offer by providing a varied multi-day holiday option for people.

It is important that we continue to diversify the economy and, within that, to diversify the individual aspects of the economy, such as tourism, and tap into as many markets as possible.

On the completely separate but continuing issue of parcel delivery charges I recently had a meeting with industry representatives in my capacity as Cabinet Secretary for Rural Affairs, along with my colleague Fergus Ewing MSP.

While regulation of the sector remains a UK Government issue their inaction on this should not mean that we don't at least try something different in Scotland. To that end a short-life working group has been established that will develop a code of conduct for retailers and couriers. It will encourage fair practice and innovative solutions to counterbalance the costs of delivery to rural, remote and island destinations.

We will work closely with Consumer Focus Scotland, retailers, couriers and others to achieve positive changes and share good practice.

In the absence of legislative powers that sit with the UK Government we must, of course, keep a close eye on how this develops, as the proof of the pudding will be in the eating.

In the meantime I continue to encourage constituents across Moray to challenge unfair delivery charges and hopefully the need to do so will become much less in the near future.

The subject of the UK Government's so-called Welfare Reform continues

to dominate my mailbag with people right across Moray affected.

If it isn't appalling decisions being taken in Fitness to Work tests, with many people who are clearly unwell and even in serious pain being told they are 'fit to work', it is the impact of Housing Benefit changes as a result of the 'Bedroom Tax'.

It is this issue that is getting the most attention both in the House of Commons and in the wider media and rightly so in my view.

The changes being made have a really significant impact on some of the most hard-pressed households - households that are already struggling with energy and food prices and who have little option but to stay in the home they are in, whether or not it has extra bedrooms.

Fundamentally I believe it is wholly wrong to expect people to downsize from a home they may well have occupied for many years and potentially have to move to a different community, away from friends and family and community groups and activities that they may be heavily involved in.

The wider impact in communities will inevitably be less money being spent in shops, as housing benefit support reduces.

I think it is also important to emphasise that the vast majority of people who will be affected are people in employment but on a low wage. People who are working hard to do the best for their family.

It is a fact that with a parliamentary majority there is a limit to what I can do as an opposition MP, however, there have beenconcessions from the government as a result of sustained pressure - not just from MPs like myself who have been opposed to the proposals from the start but also from charities and support organisations such as Citizens Advice who have raised repeated concerns about the serious impacts of the plans.

Through my constituency office I can offer support to people in Moray affected by these changes by helping to ensure that individual family circumstances are properly considered and in Westminster I will continue to challenge the welfare reform changes.

There are of course many other organisations that can also offer excellent support to people struggling with these changes, such as Citizens Advice, The Moray Council's Welfare Benefits Team and many other specialist charities who can offer support on disability issues, energy advice and much, much more.

I would urge people to take advantage of the advice and support that is out there to help deal with the major changes that are happening.

SNP REPRESENTATIVES ON SPEYSIDE BUS CONCERNS

SNP elected representatives have been pressing the Council's Administration over the future of rural transport services that cover the Tomintoul area.

Speyside Glenlivet Councillor and SNP Group Leader Pearl Paul has been raising concerns with council officers.

Cllr Paul said: "The announcement in the Council Administration's budget that all bus subsidies were to be removed was completely unexpected. Since the budget I have sought assurances that the services will not end until there is an alternative arrangement proposals has been properly considered.

"I recognise that there is a plan to extend the dial-a-bus services, however I have heard from people who remain concerned at the removalof a fixed time service, which has benefits in allowing people to plan ahead better for things like appointments.

"While the SNP opposed the budget because we believe that other significant alternatives have not been properly considered - a point we will continue to make - we are, nonetheless, realistic that we must work to get the best possible future provision and we will consider very carefully the proposals that the Council's Administration put forward."

Fellow Speyside Glenlivet Councillor Mike McConachie said: I have spoken out against these cuts but now they have been decided it is critical that the transport challenges facing people in and around Tomintoul are properly considered in any alternative that is proposed.

"People have to be able to get a service that will take them to where they need to go, whether that is a medical appointment, the supermarket or anything else. They also need a service that will givethem an appropriate amount of time at the destination before having to return.

"These are the types of issues that need to be addressed and we will be pushing these points with the Council's Administration and officers."

Richard Lochhead, MSP said: "I have heard from several constituents with concerns about the bus services and, indeed, many other budgetry concerns. It is important to be clear that, as an MSP, I do not have the power to tell the council what course they should take, however I am working closely with SNP councillor colleagues on a range of issues from the recent council budget, as well as raising concerns on behalf of constituents directly with senior council officials.

"The loss of rural transport services flies in the face supporting rural communities and people who are disadvantaged in terms of access to services or who can't afford to run a car due to the very high running costs that we currently have to endure.

"I will continue to raise these concerns and work with councillors in an effort to get the best possible outcome."

Sandy was born at Braeside Deskford, the eldest of a family of eight. After leaving school he worked as a farmhand at Muirton, Buckie



Tomintoul Youth Hostel

We are working with the Scottish Youth Hostel Association to investigate the future options for the hostel to be operated as a community hostel, affiliated to the SYHA.

The key focus of this project is to ensure the hostel can remain open for a longer period in the main tourist season, potentially creating additional jobs locally and increasing the visitor spend in the area. The remainder of the season will focus on group bookings to ensure the facility is used to best effect.

Gateway Landscaping Project

The Trust is working in partnership with the Crown Estate and the CNPA on a landscaping project at the Lecht road end lay-by and the Tomnavoulin lay-by. The focus is on improving the visual appearance of the entrance gateways and also to encourage visitors to stay in the area longer. These are the initial sites and further sites will be developed in due course.

The design proposals will be available for the community to view towards the end of February, after which the final design will be developed further and implemented in the late Spring/early Summer.

Gordon Hotel & Secondary School

The Trust are committed to the Community's desire to regenerate these buildings. We have secured funding to undertake a feasibility study on the Gordon Hotel, this will include a phase of community consultation. A variety of options will be explored further in terms of both demand and commercial viability.

Moray Council Cuts to Services Bus Services to and from Tomintoul to Keith (Tuesday) and to Elgin (Thursday)

"I, as signed below, would like to express my deep felt opposition to the proposed withdrawal of the above services. This step will cause geographic isolation for a significant number of residents in Moray and is looked on by The Moray Council as an acceptable result of living in a remote and rural part of the country.

This is not partial removal of a facility; it is proposed that there will be no bus service at all." This is the text appearing at the top of a signing sheet. After two weeks of display in Tomintoul Post Office, 260 signatures were collected. Only one name was duplicated and all signees were from the AB37 Postcode. Many thanks to Barbara Abdy and her staff for their help.

This is a tremendous effort on behalf of Toulers.

In addition, a similar sheet has been displayed in a further 5 post offices in the affected area and has been taken on the buses on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Many thanks to Val Ireland and her helpers "down the road".

When all sheets are in and names checked and counted, they will be sent in to each of our Councillors, the Convenor and the Press.

The shame of this entire episode is that not one elected representative has publicly suggested an alternative or a suggestion of how this could have been avoided. However there has been much gnashing of teeth with regret and explanations that this could not be avoided.

While all political parties and groups seem to be able to find ways of blaming predecessors and opponents for lack of planning, no one seems to be thinking to the future or about a group of people who are going to be isolated in the future. In fact, no one in authority seems to have been looking at existing services, analysing needs and even pretending to look for alternatives. There are many tourism-based initiatives in preparation for the area at the moment. Many thoughts seem to be about including visitors in our lives, but no thought seems to be being given to people who live here.

It is very difficult to know how to mobilise opinion on this subject. If we wanted to picket the Council Offices, WE WOULD NOT BE ABLE TO GET THERE, BECAUSE THERE IS NO TRANSPORT.


Chris Townsend, Writer, Long Distance Walker, Joins the Walking Festival

7. Favourite town or city?


I don't really do cities, but the" human zoo" that is Amsterdam has its interests.....

Touler Book Review

The Living Mountain by Nan Shepherd

The Living Mountain" is a very personal account of one woman's relationship with the Cairngorm Mountains, its people and wildlife.

The author, Nan Shepherd, was born in 1893 and although she travelled extensively lived all her adult life in West Cults on North Deeside and was an avid local hill walker.

Her passion and enthusiasm for the mountains and her appreciation of the natural world is conveyed in this intimate diary of her relationship with the Cairngorms, not quite cradle to grave but from bare foot youngster to mature and experienced navigator.

Her prose was composed during World War II with no immediate expectation of publication and it remained dormant for thirty years, only being rediscovered by the author as she was clearing out her desk in later life. Fortunately her meditations found a publisher.

It has been expertly prefaced by Robert Macfarlane who has local connections. He records;

"My grandparents lived in a converted forestry cottage on a rare limestone upsurge on the north eastern slope of the massif and the field of the rough pasture which they owned ran down to the River Avon".

His grandparents were the Pecks who lived above Kylnadrochit.

Nan Shepherd walked in the mountains, not to bag summits, but as she describes it "as one visits a friend". Sometimes bare foot she stops to drink the freezing water filtered through granite and on a summer day swims in the lochs. Hers is an unhurried observation. She stops to listen to stags baying, she grubs in the earth and appreciates the smell of the natural world; the honeyed heather, the wet birch "fruity like brandy", the broken twig of juniper and "the good smell of earth, one of the best smells in the world." But it is the people, deep rooted in the landscape for generations that have characters as endearing and as challenging as the mountain who are also a significant feature in her writing. She describes them as "gritty, tough,--- intelligent, full of prejudice---and a salted sense of humour." She clearly loved and admired them.

She introduces the reader to the two women, both over eighty, who drag home dead roots to use as kindling building the splinters into a pyramid "with their brown hand". The Rothiemurchus "mighty" gamekeeper and his wife Big Mary, "there was no malice in her. But she was salt and salt can be harsh". The author describes arriving in Aviemore on the day of her funeral and noting thankfully that someone had made a wreath for her "from heather and rowan berries, oats and barley and juniper". It was a poignant link between man and nature.

This book takes the reader high on to the plateau and into the kitchens of the likes of Big Mary. There is no doubt of her admiration for the people who are "the bone of the mountain" but her real passion was the mountain and the effect it had upon her.

This is a slim volume but has been described as "The finest book ever written on nature and landscape in Britain."

latter ones were Jim Hastings, one of the best session saxophonists in Britain and his brother Pye, a member of Caravan. However, there is another fiddle player who is making his mark on the Folk Scene in Glasgow and elsewhere.

Pedro (Peter) Cameron is a member of The Dirty Beggars, a band which plays mainly Blue Grass Music but in their own style which is influenced by Scottish Folk Music.


It all come about because his parents had tickets for an Old Crow Medicine Show gig in Glasgow but their car got broken into by having a window smashed. They had the dog with them so went home and Peter went to the show where he met up with the other boys that now form the band and the rest, as they say, is history.

Peter has always been very interested in music and from a young age used to sing along with his family, especially his Grandma, as she played the piano. When his parents moved from Tomintoul down to Perthshire he continued his love of music and was, for a short time, part of the Scottish Junior Orchestra. The family again moved to Fife where he attended Wade Academy in Anstruther where he continued to keep up his music and was described as being a gifted fiddle player. After leaving school he drifted a little before settling in Glasgow where he now stays.

The Dirty Beggars are a group incorporating a double bass, two acoustic guitars, banjo and fiddle. The members are brothers Peter and Finn Begbie and their cousin Kieran Begbie who all come from Peebles; Stuart Printie frown Dunblane and Peter. They play bluegrass style music heavily influenced by their country of origin. They have played many venues in the south of Scotland and been on tour in America where they went down very well. They have been involved in Celtic Connections in 2012 and 2013 and are soon to be on the same billing as Van Morrison.

The Dirty Beggars play music that is easy to listen to and is innovative. Why not listen to them on Youtube? If you like what you hear you can download tracks. That is a bit beyond me; I like CDs or discs.

Hopefully they will continue to go from strength to strength and stay together as a group for years to come. The boy done good!!!


Room 101

Revised hub location details

The Crown Estate is currently in the process of reconsidering the location of the proposed car park and forest 'hub' which was originally given planning approval as part of this project. This is as a result of several factors which have emerged during the trail construction phase, including advice received from the consultants involved in the project.

We are keen to ensure that the hub is situated in a location which provides the best possible experience for customers as well as opportunities for the successful development of a 'hub' business.

The proposed new location will better fit the character of the trails due to some amendments to its original design and will offer an elevated location for bikers to begin their journeys from.

We feel that the revised location will provide better customer satisfaction and assist with attracting more visitors to the trails, providing further economic benefit to the local area in terms of increased visitor numbers.

The proposed new site is located in a secluded location within a former quarry on the East side of Carn Meilich (please see attached map). Access to the hub will follow the same route southwards along the Croughly Road from Tomaclaggan as approved in the initial application, although visitors will enter the forest track prior to the junction to Glenconglass.

Dr. John Herbert 1936-2013

Dr. John 'Phil' Herbert's was born in Wales on June 26th, 1936. He moved to Welwyn Garden City, Hertfordshire, where he excelled in secondary education and sport, playing semi-professionally for St. Alban's City F.C.

Dr. Herbert went on to study medicine at St. Bartholomew's Hospital Medical College, London, and graduated in 1966 with a Bachelor of Medicine and Surgery degree. He became registered with The Royal College of General Practitioners in 1976.

His love of children and babies was to be a hallmark of his career – from the jar of sweets on his desk to the motivation to pursue a degree in obstetrics and gynaecology.

Dr Herbert carried out the early part of his career in the Army, working for many years in Germany, Cyprus and Yemen. He gained a certificate in the medicine of aviation and retired from the Army with the rank of major.

During his years in the forces, he developed a 'firm but fair' professional demeanour for which he is still fondly remembered by former patients.

He was very traditional and straightforward and if he had bad news to deliver, he did it in person.

Dr. Herbert met his wife Carolyn in 1993 at Droitwich Spa, Worsestershire, where he was a GP and

she was a matron at a nursing home. Mrs Herbert says it was love at first sight. In 1997, the couple eloped to Gretna Green, and set their sights on a new life in Scotland.

While touring the country, they stopped at the Allargue Arms Hotel near Corgarff, fell in love with the area and so handed their notices in and took a 21 year lease on a rundown cottage and rebuilt it into a family home.

Dr Herbert was latterly the associate GP at Tomintoul Medical Centre. He was an active member of the community – even up to the last few weeks of his life- and was embraced in return.

15 years ago, the first signs of Dr Herbert's dementia began to show. He made it clear at the beginning, he did not want medical treatment, and Mrs Herbert worked tirelessly to help him.

Before his death, he was part of a pioneering programme in which dementia patients receive care within their own environments. This approach is to be researched at Stirling University.

Dr Herbert passed away peacefully at home on February 11th, aged 76.

Despite the latter stages of their 25 year marriage being complicated by Dr Herbert's degenerative condition, Mrs Herbert said: "It was worth every second. He was my love, husband and best friend."

Helen Murray MacFarlane (Nurse)

Helen was born at Delgarvan, Blacksboat, Ballindalloch, on the banks of the Spey. She was the ninth of ten children born to William and Mary Macdonald

Her schooling was undertaken at Inveraan School and she then went on to train as a nurse. She was at Dr. Gray's in Elgin from 1938 till 1941. From there she did some private nursing in Aberdeen before undertaking Midwifery training at Castlehill, Aberdeen 1942-1943. Her wartime nursing was at several places, Ian Charles Hospital in Grantown-on-Spey, St. Johns Hospital in Chelmsford, and Montrose Royal Infirmary.

After the war she did some home nursing at Leonchoil in Forres from 1948 – 1949.

At that time she decided to become a District Nurse and the training for this was done at Edinburgh and then Elgin. Once qualified she did Relief District Nursing in Dunkeld and Blair Atholl in Perthshire. Whilst at Blair Atholl she met Andrew MacFarlane and they married in Inveraven Church in March 1953.

Helen became District Nurse at Tomintoul in 1955, a post she held until ill health caused her to retire in 1977. During her 22 years of duty to Tomintoul, A'anside, The Braes and Glenlivet she brought many bouncing babies into the world. She attended to the nursing care of young and old in her district working closely with Doctors Paul and Carnachan initially, followed by Low and Anderson.

Together with Andy (Andy Pandy to his family), and his First Aid training gained through work on

attended railways, Helen many incidents including road accidents in the area, many involving a journey to hospital in either Elgin or Aberdeen in the emergency ambulance car driven by Peter Grant of the Gordon Arms Hotel. Again with Andy's help and many volunteers she organised the Tomintoul Blood Donation Sessions for many years. Andy was very good at gathering many 'first timers' from the beaters on Estates around Tomintoul as well as local donors who have carried on the Good Work travelling many miles to give their "PINTA" since there is no longer a session in the village.

Known ALWAYS as Nurse MacFarlane, Nurse or Nursie, Helen attended her patients above and beyond her normal duties and was well respected by the Communities she served.

Having moved from Tomintoul to Ballindalloch following her retirement, for a period of two years, she and Andy returned 'Home' to Tomintoul in 1982 where sadly Andy died later that year.

Helen was always active after her retirement, walking Jo-Jo, Church flower arranging, charity collections, family and friends to look after; always the kindly nurse. She took long walks, accompanied by Jo-Jo, up A'anside, The Speyside Way, Loch Callater and I'm sure many more than you can remember. Family was important to her, the roots of the Macdonalds' and the families of her sisters and brothers and of course grandchildren and great-grandchildren of Andy's were always welcome. Her brother Patty was for many years the tenant of Inverchor; at one point taking leave of absence from the farm to cycle round Australia, no mean feat.

In 2003 she entered the Speyside Home. Initially physically fit, she became a familiar figure walking in Aberlour but sadly she became confused and was content to let others care for her.

She was also a talented amateur artist and several houses in Tomintoul display her art works on their walls.

Helen was a dedicated caring nurse in the true sense of the word and she will be sadly missed by all her family and many friends in the community of Tomintoul and its surrounding area.

Forestry Update

Recipe Corner

Roast Pork Loin with Apples

Ingredients

2lb (1kg) Loin of Pork, boned and rolled

2 Cooking Apples sliced
1 Onion chopped
1 tbsp (15ml) Flour
1/4 pt (150ml) Sour Cream
1 oz (25g) Butter
1/2 pt (300ml) Water
1 tsp (5ml) Mustard
Salt and Pepper

Method

Make 10 - 12 slits on both sides of the pork and insert half of the apple slices into the slits

Rub the pork with salt and pepper.

Melt the butter in a deep flameproof dish

Add the pork, onion and remaining apple slices and fry for 8 - 10 minutes until the meat is evenly browned Add the water and bring to the boil

Simmer for about 1½ hours or until meat is cooked through

Transfer meat to a warmed serving dish and keep hot. Stir the flour and mustard into the cooking juice and cook stirring constantly until the liquid thickens.

Stir in the cream heat gently and serve with the pork as gravy. I cooked this in the oven rather than a pot, it took about the same time

I also used Granny Smith Apples as that was what I had at home it worked well just needed 4 instead of two cookers Remember to remove the apple cores.

Serve with potatoes and green vegetables. Carrots and neeps do not work well.

If you get a piece of Pork Loin that isn't rolled just put apples in the top and put rest into the sauce.

French Tomato Casserole

Ingredients

 $1\frac{1}{4} - \frac{1}{2}$ lbs ($\frac{1}{2} - \frac{3}{4}$ kg) Ripe tomatoes

1 Aubergine, small 2 Courgettes, small

2-3 Onions depending on size and preference

2oz (50g) Bacon cut like lardons

1-2 Garlic cloves 10 Olives

4fl oz (100ml) dry Red Wine

Salt, Pepper, Paprika, Parsley, Thyme, Marjoram, Basil

Method

Wash vegetables and cut into slices or strips. Scald and peel tomatoes before slicing them

Sprinkle coarse salt in sliced aubergines and courgettes and leave in a cool place for about 30

minutes. Then pat dry

Sauté sliced onions and bacon in small cubes on moderate heat. Add crushed garlic, dried aubergine and courgettes, tomatoes, olives and red wine.

Simmer for 10 minutes Add finely chopped herbs and summer for a further 5–10 minutes.

Season with salt pepper and paprika.

This can be used as an accompanying dish or on its own I do not care for olives so substituted button mushrooms and a green pepper.

Dried herbs can be used if fresh are not available.

There should be enough fat comes from the bacon but use a little Olive Oil if required.

If using as a main dish increase amount of bacon.

Tinned tomatoes can be used to save time.
